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Wilkins got out of bed, he brushed his teeth, patted his dog, Bob, and put on his cowboy boots.


They weren't just ordinary boots. For one thing, they were red. They were soft, too, as soft as Bob's ears.

... and he learned to see things from a different point of view.




B ut when he looked down, expecting to see the magic boots, all he saw were his own bare feet.
